The formulation and development of the Statistical Abstract (2021/2022) is a follow up of the same series that was started in 2006/7 as part of the Ministry's effort to support data user needs. The Ministry endeavors to provide reliable and timely statistical data for evidence-based planning at ministry and among the stake holders on annual basis.

The abstract contains information derived from administrative records at the national and Local Government level. It covers information on sector interventions in areas of social protection for the vulnerable groups, Community mobilization and empowerment, Integrated Community learning for Wealth Creation (ICOLEW), National Libraries of Uganda, issues on Occupational Safety and Health (OSH), Orphans and other Vulnerable Children (OVC), information on Gender Based Violence (GBV), labour and Industrial Relations, Employment Services, women empowerment, information on children's institutions/Alternative Care, SAGE and Youth.

Ministry of Gender Labour and Social Development wishes to extend her gratitude to all individuals, and Institutions for availing data for this statistical publication. Special thanks to all participating stake holders especially the Ministry departments who have enabled us to compile the Statistical Abstract. ## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This abstract presents in-depth analysis of statistics generated from the three directorates of the ministry that include: labour, Employment and Occupational safety, Gender and community development and directorate of social protection. The abstract is divided into four chapters to capture statistics on labour, Social Protection and Gender statistics. The fourth chapter comprises of the appendices, list of tables and of figures.

Chapter One presents statistics on Department of Labour, Industrial Relations and Productivity, Green Jobs and Fair Labour Market Programme, Occupational Safety and Health, Employment statistics, Externalization of Labour and Non-Taxable Revenue (NTR) Collections.

In summary: Number of persons in the working population (14-64 years) increased from 15.9 to 20.5 million between 2019/20 and 2021. The proportion of males in the working population increased by $28 \%$ while the proportion of the females increased by $30 \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021. Majority (49.6\%) of the PWDs are not engaged in any form of employment.

Overall, the majority of the working population work in the rural areas ( 14.4 m ) followed by urban areas ( 6.1 m ) and most of them $(5.4 \mathrm{~m})$ reside in the central and western regions respectively

Child Labour generally increased from $38.5 \%$ to $39.5 \%$ over the period 2019/20 and 2021 and was highest in the age category of 5-11-year. The results from the last National Labor Force Survey, published in 2021, show that an estimated 6.2 million ( $40 \%$ ) children aged between $5-17$ are in child labor.

Under green Jobs and Fair labour Market, a total of 227 groups were supported in 2019/20 and this dropped to only 16 groups in 2020/21. In addition, the number of beneficiaries increased from 2,618 in 2019/20 to 3,306 in 2019/20.

For the people employed within Uganda, employment population increased from 38.8\% to $42.5 \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021. The Employment population ratio (EPR) was higher (52\%) amongst males compared to the females (34\%) in 2021.

A total of 92,674 workers were sent abroad and of these, $8,633(9.3 \%)$ were males and $84,041(90.7 \%)$ were females.

Revenue generated as NTR under department of OSH, and Employment services amounted to a total of UGX 1.82 billion in 2021/22 and 1,348 workplaces were registered cumulatively with NTR collected to a tune of 1.353 billion. Similarly, from Remittances/Personal transfers, a total of UGX 438,000,000
revenue was generated through licensing of recruitment companies and renewing licenses of the existing recruitment companies.

Chapter Two gives information on social protection statistics, specifically on Disability and Elderly Statistics (Social Assistance Grant for Empowerment, SAGE), Youth and Children affairs statistics, the SAUTI Helpline, and Alternative Care Statistics. For PWDs during the FY2021/22 a total number of projects funded were 1,534 benefiting a total of 12,381 PWDs' in the country. This shows a percentage increase of $47 \%$ in the number of projects funded and an increase of $45 \%$ in the number of beneficiaries supported. The disbursements of funds to PWDs Project sector by sex, reflects that Agriculture was the most funded sector followed by trade.

Under the SAGE Programme, in 2021/22, a total of 329,631 benefitted from the programme out of which 197,987(60\%) were females and 131,644 (40\%) were males.

Close analysis of data from the SAUTT helpline revealed that calls made to the SAUTI helpline by sex of the callers, reveals that 6,838 were abuse cases, 2,139 were counselling cases and 773 calls were for inquiry. Of the reported child abuse cases 3,787(59.6\%) were females and 2,563(40.3\%).

The greatest reported child abuse case was that of child neglect with $3,117(49.1 \%)$ cases followed by physical violence with 1,166 (18.4\%) cases.

This chapter also reveals that a total of 9,223 children are hosted under Alternative Care and of these the majority ( $63.2 \%$ ) are in central, ( $10.1 \%$ ), are in Eastern, 1344(14.6\%) are in Northern, and 1118(12.1\%) are in Western Uganda. Currently there are still about 280 unlicensed facilities/ Homes in Uganda due to various reasons.

Youth Livelihood programme statistics reveals that as of end of June 2022, a total of Ushs $\mathbf{3 9 . 0 9}$ billion had been recovered out of the Ushs $\mathbf{1 6 9 . 4 1}$ billion that had been disbursed. A total of 18.07 billion had been rotated by June 2022. A total of $\mathbf{4 4 8}$ groups had made $100 \%$ normal recoveries and had been profiled. The recovery made by these groups alone was Ushs 3.25 billion with the main project being Motorcycle Transport (19.9\%), Bull Fattening (16.3\%), Agricultural Trade (15.4\%).

Chapter Three presents' statistics from Community Development and literacy Department. It details statistics on Integrated Community Learning for Wealth Creation (ICOLEW), Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme, and Gender Based Violence.

Under the department of Family and Culture Affairs, a study of culture and creative industries was conducted, and the results revealed that $20 \%$ of creative arts are registered under private companies
while public companies registered the least ownership for the creative sector. The majority of individuals in culture and creative industries were males ( $68 \%$ ). Results further revealed that majority of individuals in cultural and creative industries were aged 31 years and above males ( $68 \%$ ). sixty-four percent of individuals at least had an o' level certificate.

Under the Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme, a total of 191,476 women had benefitted from 16,542 projects and of these $6,558(3.4 \%)$ women benefited from the capacity building and skills component while $184,918(96.6 \%)$ benefitted from the women enterprise fund. The disbursement by sector shows that a total of shs. 105,184,577= was disbursed and of this 42.6 billion ( $40.5 \%$ ) went to whole sale and retail trade followed by Agriculture 34.9 billion ( $33.2 \%$ ). The least sector supported was ICT with 57 million ( $0.1 \%$ ). The highest amount of money was disbursed to the wholesale and retail trade sector ( $40.2 \%$ ) followed by Agriculture sector (33.7\%) mainly attributed to the fact that most women groups were involved in these sectors.

Out of a total UGX 32,483,631,924 expected to be recovered by 30th June, 2022, UGX 6,712,458, 106 had been recovered.

Cases of Gender based violence reported reflected that denial of resources (31\%), physical assault ( $27 \%$ ), and psychological abuse ( $22 \%$ ) constituted the highest cases of GBV. $82 \%$ of the survivors were females and $18 \%$ were males. The most common types of GBV incidence are physical assault, denial of resources \& opportunities and psychological abuse. Females are the largest number of victims recorded in the database. Female genital mutilation was the least type of violence recorded. In addition, $2.3 \%$ of the victims of GBV have some form of disability while $1.3 \%$ of victims were non-Ugandans.

The last Chapter Four presents' Appendices, list of tables and figures that are richly endowed with statistics that can be easily interpreted and the figures give a visual impression of the statistics.

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## CHAPTER ONE: LABOUR, EMPLOYMENT AND OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY STATISTICS

### 1.1 LABOUR STATISTICS

Labour statistics are vital in the measurement of productivity and environment/working conditions of the labour force which enable a sustainable approach to the economic growth and development of the nation. This chapter therefore presents statistics on selected Labour market indicators.

## Key Labour Indicators of the Working population

The number of persons in the working population (14-64 years) increased from 15.9 to 20.5 million between 2019/20 and 2021. The proportion of males in the working population increased by $28 \%$ while the proportion of the females increased by $30 \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021

The proportion of working population in urban areas increased by $29 \% \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021. Northern Region had the highest increase (47\%) in working population, followed by the Central Region at $38 \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021.

Overall, the majority of the working population work in the rural areas followed by urban areas and the majority of the working population reside in the central region.

Looking at the involvement of workers by sector the highest percentage of the working population is engaged in Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries as shown in table 2 followed by Trade.

## Child Labour

Child Labour generally increased from $38 \%$ to $39.5 \%$ between 2019/20 and 2021. Child Labour was highest in the age category of 5 to 11 years. The results from the last National Labor Force Survey, published in 2021, show that an estimated 6.2 million children aged 5-17 are in child labor.

It is estimated that about 10 million persons ( $49 \%$ of the Working Population) were in employment; an increase from 8.3 million reported in 2019/20. The proportion of employed females was 41 percent in 2021 nearly the same proportion in 2019/20

## Beneficiary groups and beneficiaries under the Green Jobs Programme

The Green Jobs programme aims at creating decent employment, enhancing labour productivity, reducing poverty and ensuring environmental sustainability. Figure 5 shows that the programme supported 277 groups with 3,306 beneficiaries in 2019 the highest number to date. In addition, the number of beneficiaries increased from 2,618 in 2017/2018 to 3,306 in 2019/20. Thereafter there was a drastic drop in the number of beneficiary groups from 277 to 16 in 2020/21. This eventually rose up to 93 in the FY 2021/22. This has majorly been attributed to delays in the processes of procurement of the group equipment's and funds availability.

### 1.2 EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

## Employment to population ratio (EPR)

The Employment to Population Ratio (EPR)is the proportion of the working age population that is employed. Generally, the EPR increased from $38.8 \%$ to $42.5 \%$ between $2019 / 20$ and 2021. The EPR was higher among males ( $52 \%$ ) than females ( $34 \%$ ) as it has been over the recent years. The EPR recorded in urban areas in 2021 was higher ( $51.2 \%$ ) than in rural areas ( $38.4 \%$ ) meaning that a larger proportion of persons in urban areas are employed compared to rural areas. The EPR was highest for persons aged 31 to 64 years.

## CHAPTER TWO: SOCIAL PROTECTION STATISTICS

### 2.1 EQUAL OPPOURTUNITIES STATISTICS

The Equal Opportunities Commission receives, registers and arbitrates on matters of marginalization and discrimination in Uganda. Individuals, groups and institutions report these complaints, to the Commission through pre-tribunals, mobile clinics, and awareness campaigns among other avenues.

## Complaints on violation of Equal opportunities

During the Financial year 2021/2022, 697 complaints from youth, women, men, ethnic minorities, older persons, persons with disabilities and other vulnerable groups were received by the commission and 511 were registered.

### 2.2 DISABILITY AND ELDERLY STATISTICS

During the FY2021/22 a total number of projects funded were 1,534 benefiting a total of 12,381 PWDs' in the country. This shows a percentage increase of $47 \%$ in the number of projects funded and an increase of $45 \%$ in the number of beneficiaries supported.

### 2.3 Social Assistance Grant for Empowerment

To address the plight of older persons, the Government introduced SAGE programme which provides the Senior Citizens Grants (SCG) to older persons aged 60 and above for those in Karamoja Region and those that are 65 and above for those in other regions. The grant provides all beneficiaries with monthly payments of UGX 25,000.

Over the years (206/17 to 2021/22), the number of SAGE beneficiaries have continuously increased. Of these, females' beneficiaries were more (60\%) compared to their male counterparts (40\%). It should be noted that, although the number of males is lower than that of their female counter parts, it has continuously increased.

### 2.3.2 ORPHANS AND OTHER VULNERABLE CHILDREN (OVC)

An Orphan is a child below the age of 18 years who has lost one or both parents. A vulnerable child is that child who is suffering and or is living in circumstances where he/she is likely to suffer any form of abuse or deprivation and is therefore in need of care and protection. These children benefit from OVC services including their relatives/Guardians who are 18 years and above and are responsible for their wellbeing.

### 2.4 ALTERNATIVE CARE STATISTICS

### 2.4.1 SUMMARY STATISTICS FROM ALTERNATIVE CARE HOMES

The Government of Uganda under the Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social Development has continuously made progress in functionalizing the Alternative Care system for children that need protection and safety care. In FY 2018/19 the government of Uganda together with partners therefore embarked on the development of the Alternative care Management Information System (ACMIS). The ACMIS currently captures data from a total of 173 homes that are registered in Uganda. Of these, the majority $95(55 \%)$ are in central, $30(17 \%)$ are in Eastern, 28(16\%) are in western, and 20(12\%) are in Northern Uganda. Currently there are still about 280 unlicensed facilities/ Homes in Uganda due to various reasons

## Children Accommodated in the Registered and Approved homes

The total number of children accommodated in these Homes currently stands at 9,223 . Of these, the majority ( $63.2 \%$ ) are in central, ( $10.1 \%$ ), are in Eastern, 1344(14.6\%) are in Northern, and 1118(12.1\%) are in Western Uganda. Currently there are still about 280 unlicensed facilities/ Homes in Uganda due to various reasons and deliberate efforts have to be made to ensure that these homes are
properly guided to be registered so that they operate legally and are properly monitored for effective service delivery to the children.

## Performance of YLP Revolving funds

As of end of June 2022, a total of Ushs $\mathbf{3 9 . 0 9}$ billion had been recovered out of the Ushs $\mathbf{1 6 9 . 4 1}$ billion that had been disbursed. A total of 18.07 billion had been rotated by June 2022. A total of 448 groups had made $100 \%$ normal recoveries and had been profiled. The recovery made by these groups alone was Ushs 3.25 billion with the main project being Motorcycle Transport (19.9\%), Bull Fattening (16.3\%), Agricultural Trade (15.4\%).

Generally, funds recovery was on a positive trend recording the highest amount of Ushs 4 billion in quarter one of FY 2019/20 as shown in the figure below. From FY 2019/20 the programme started experiencing a downward trend in funds recovery. This was occasioned by a drastic budget cut of $95 \%$ (from UGX. 66bn to UGX. 3.3bn) that the programme experienced. This resulted into YLP inability to provide operations fund to LGs, thus a major drawback to funds recovery.

## CHAPTER THREE: GENDER STATISTICS

### 3.1 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND LITERACY STATISTICS

The Department of Community Development and Literacy focuses on empowering communities to appreciate, uptake and demand service delivery. It is responsible for providing functional skills to nonand semi-illiterate adults and promoting a reading culture among communities as well as strengthening community information systems and structures for mobilization.

## Integrated Community Learning for Wealth Creation (ICOLEW)

Integrated Community Learning for Wealth Creation (ICOLEW) Programme aims at empowering nonand semi- literate youth and adults to acquire literacy and numeracy skills and utilize these skills to effectively participate in the development processes. The programme has been piloted since 2016 first in 3 districts of Iganga, Mpigi, Namayingo and Nwoya in 2018. Following the successful implementation, it was recommended from national rollout in the FY 2020/21.

### 3.2 Family and Culture Affairs

In the study to map culture and creative sector, results revealed that $20 \%$ of creative arts are registered under private companies while public companies registered the least ownership for the creative sector. The majority of individuals in Cultural and Creative Industries were males (68\%). Results farther revealed that majority of individuals in Cultural and Creative Industries were aged 31 years and above males (68\%). Sixty-four percent of individuals at least had an O' Level Certificate.

### 3.3 GENDER AND WOMEN AFFAIRS STATISTICS

## Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme

The Uganda Women Entrepreneurship Programme is an initiative by the Government of Uganda that is aimed at improving access to financial services by women (18-65 years) and equipping them with skills for enterprise growth, value addition and marketing of their products and services. UWEP is intended to empower Ugandan women for economic Development.

The Programme rolled out to all the Districts and Municipalities in Uganda including Kampala Capital City Authority (KCCA).

The biggest proportion ( $25 \%$ ) of disbursements were made to women groups in the Financial Year 2020/2021 with a direct benefit to 4,041 Projects and 41,102 women as shown in the figure below.

## Amount Disbursed by Sector

The highest amount of money was disbursed to the wholesale and retail trade sector ( $40.2 \%$ ) followed by Agriculture sector (33.7\%) mainly attributed to the fact that most women groups were involved in these sectors.

Out of a total UGX $32,483,631,924$ expected to be recovered by $30^{\text {th }}$ June, 2022, UGX 26,712,458, 106 had been recovered which was $82 \%$ recovery rate. Out of the gross recoveries made, UGX $10,703,229,580$ had been revolved back to fund new groups in the respective Local Governments. The details of recovery rate per Local Government are in the attached Annex.

### 3.4 GENDER BASED VIOLENCE STATISTICS

The Ministry established the National Gender Based Violence Database where information reported to the Ministry concerning gender-based violence is kept. This section presents information contained in the database between 2020 and 2022.

The most common types of GBV incidence are physical assault, denial of resources \& opportunities and psychological abuse. Females are the largest number of victims recorded in the database. Female genital mutilation was the least type of violence recorded. In addition, $2.3 \%$ of the victims of GBV have some form of disability while $1.3 \%$ of victims were non-Ugandans.
